Teaching in a one-to-one environment looks a lot differently than traditional classrooms. Here are some of the differences you may want to be aware of as you conduct classroom observations and teacher evaluations.

TRADITIONAL	ONE-TO-ONE CLASSROOM
Learning targets written on the boards	Learning targets posted in Schoology, posted in Powerpoints, posted in assignments
Teacher circulating to monitor students	Teacher sitting at the desk monitoring through DyKnow and sending students messages
Teacher giving verbal feedback to students while they are working	Teachers commenting on shared assignments in the Google Drive giving real time feedback from their desks
Students working in groups or having discussions	Students collaborating in digital documents rather than in person; students having online discussions or giving feedback digitally
Differentiated work for students	Teachers assigning different work to different groups digitally
Hard copy of lesson plans and materials; distribution of materials	Access materials by joining the Schoology course in order to see what students see
Up front, direct instruction	More blended instruction and self-paced learning
Engagement looks like students moving and talking	Even when students are sitting and looking at a screen or not talking, they can be engaged in meaningful work and discussions

In light of these differences, you may want to

- Sit where you can see the teacher's screen
- Access the teacher's Schoology course during the observation
